They did an outstanding job carefully evaluating all 19 entries. The first place winner was Metrick's Harvest View Farm Market in Butler, PA.

I also want to thank Adams County Nursery, Waffler Nursery, Midwest Apple Improvement Association, Chris Walsh, Jim Schupp and Don Smith for bringing apple cultivars for the Variety Showcase on Wednesday. Again, the room was full and I thought we had a good discussion about the merits and deficiencies of the cultivars on display. Contrary to what a lot of attendees want, we will be waiting a year or so before doing this type of session again. Hopefully, the next time the growing season will not be as trying and my fruit quality will be better.

The Board of Directors of SHAP had a fruitful meeting with Dean Roush, Dean of the College of Agricultural Sciences while in Hershey.
